The larks, still bravely singing, fly


Scarce heard amid the guns below.

Elinor Barr's Visits Ignace Public Library





WINTER VEHICLE PARKING

Bylaw 67.2021 is a bylaw to Regulate Traffic and Parking within the Township of Ignace.

67.2021 Section 6; states;

No person shall park or permit to be parked on any highway between the hours of 7:00 am and 6:00pm daily from 01 November to 30 April of the following year.

Vehicles parked illegally during these dates and times may be subjected to a \$100 fine or have the vehicle towed, at the owners' expense, as per 67.2021 Section 15.1.



Do you have Issues with Frozen Water Lines?

Aqua-Flo is a waterline freeze protection appliance that uses the principle that moving water does not freeze readily. Aqua-Flo maintains a continuous flow of water in your water service line 24 hours a day. This is accomplished by an automatic BLEED, CAPTURE and RETURN method. Water is constantly flowing, but is not being wasted into the sewer system.

Simply stated, this appliance maintains constant flow of water through a single service line and returns the water into the system through the same water line without any loss. **Also, as the temperature gets cold, check your heat trace on your water lines; insulate the lines before the snow gets here.**

The Fiber To The Home project that was announced back in May in 2022 is on hold until the Spring of 2023. Tom Motyka, the President at Celerity Telecom offers an explanation about the project:

“Hello everyone, my name is Tom Motyka and I feel I should introduce myself and try to shed some light on this thread as it seems there is a lot of misinformation going around. I am the President at Celerity Telecom. We are a small, independent ISP that have been serving Northwestern Ontario since 2016 focusing on underserved regions when it comes to broadband. In 2020, we were approached by Northwestern Ontario Innovation Centre (NOIC) to see if we were interested in bringing Fiber-to-the-home FTTH service to Ignace as none of the larger telcos showed interest. Since our company is focused on providing better Internet services to towns just like Ignace, we jumped at this opportunity. At the time the Federal Government announced \$2.75 B in funding under the Universal Broadband Fund (<https://ised-isde.canada.ca/site/high-speed-internet-canada/en/universal-broadband-fund>) to bring better broadband to all Canadians, with the requirement of providing at least 50 Mbps/10Mbps speeds to areas approved for funding. NOIC, as the applicant, and Celerity as a funding partner and operator, submitted a proposal to bring FTTH to Ignace. In addition to the UBF applications, we also submitted an application for funding to ICON (<https://www.ontario.ca/page/ontario-connects-making-high-speed-internet-accessible-in-every-community>), which is an Ontario Government sponsored program to improve Broadband in communities throughout Ontario. We were delighted to receive notice in mid-2021 that our project was selected for funding by the Federal Government. We did not find out about the approval from ICON until later that same year. The funding broke down as follows: 50 % of the project cost would be covered by Universal Broadband Fund (UBF), 24.64 % would be covered by ICON and the remaining 25.36 % would be privately funded by Celerity Telecom Inc. The estimated dollar amount for this project is around \$1.8M. In addition to the \$480 K investment Celerity is making to the infrastructure build, we will also be investing an additional \$300 K in other non-eligible expenses. During the winter months between 2021 and 2022 we worked hard to finalize all the details to get this project started as early as the weather would allow. An unusually long winter and slow snow melt meant we were not able to start any construction work until May, a full month later than what we had hoped. Unfortunately, due to what I can only assume were bureaucratic delays and red tape, an actual agreement with the Federal Government wasn't signed until late June and a funding agreement with the Ontario government wasn't signed until mid-September. This unfortunately, forced us to stop construction for winter and plan to start up again in the springtime.

Now, I would like to address some of the concerns in this thread. The conduit that you see sticking out of the ground will be buried or placed in a vault. There are **NO** live circuits anywhere in any of the conduit you see sticking out. The orange copper line that you see along with the conduit is called a tracer wire and is simply used for locating the conduit once it is buried and is what we use to locate the fiber when you request a locate from Ontario One Call. Our contractor tried to bury as much of the conduit as possible before they had to break for the season, but some of it is still obviously sticking out. This will be addressed this week as we have workers coming to place pylons and mark the exposed conduit. We realize that some damage to the conduit is likely by snow clearing or simply driving too close to the area. Any damage is repairable and will be addressed once we can get our crews back to the area in Spring; surface damage to the conduit will not jeopardize the project. We apologize for this inconvenience this will cause some residents and ask that the community work with us on this issue.

The project is **NOT** being abandoned and will be completed next summer; you have my word. There is absolutely no danger in someone simply touching the empty conduit or the orange wire along side it. The conduit that you see is called a 7-way conduit. The centre conduit will carry the main “Trunk” fiber cable that will run throughout the entire town. The 6 conduits surrounding the centre conduit are designated as drop conduits, they will be used to install the drop cable from our vault to your home, one vault is normally placed between 12 homes. When a customer wants to get hooked up, we will expose the main conduit that will run in the right of way in front of your

home, cut into the outer sheath and extend the conduit that is designated to service your home. We will use a small vibratory plow to install the conduit through your yard about 6" deep to the side of your home into a small device box. Getting our service is voluntary, no one is forced to sign up or get a conduit installed in their yard if they do not wish to.

To be absolutely clear, no one is getting a "kick back or fee for every hook up." In addition, the township was not asked to provide ANY funding towards this project. While it's true that you as a taxpayer to the Ontario and Canadian governments are partially funding this project, isn't it good to know that the investment is being made in your hometown rather than some far off community in another part of Canada which you would still fund regardless? In addition to the government funding, there is \$780K of private investment coming into the town, which would not have been the case if the project was not approved. Once the project is complete, Celerity will be offering speeds of 1 Gbps, which is likely much faster than you are currently getting from your existing provider. What's more, is that these speeds are symmetrical, meaning that your upload speeds and download speeds are the same. Sending a large email or simply backing up your smart device to the cloud will take seconds rather than hours. With the added benefit of having fiber service in your town, it increases the possibility of new families moving in if they know that a fast and reliable fiber optic connection is available and are now able to work remotely from home. With regards to monthly pricing, we base our pricing at levels similar to what larger carriers are offering in major cities, however please understand that a major cost of delivering the service to Ignace is the monthly cost we will be paying to our upstream provider to get a fiber connection from Ignace to the outside world. If you are concerned about the installation fee, please keep an eye out when we launch service next year as we will be having a limited time offer where we waive the installation fee while our crews are working in the area. Once our crews leave the area however, the installation charge will likely be re-instated to try to recover some of the cost to bring someone back.

Another valid concern that I see brought up is that why were the residents not informed of this project. This is absolutely a valid point and one that needs addressing. When this project was conditionally approved but no agreements were in place, we were asked not make any public announcements. A formal announcement was planned once all the agreements were signed and we expected this to happen mid-summer. However, with the extremely long delay for both levels of government to sign the agreements, meant that we would be making an announcement for a project that would likely not be finished until the following summer. Therefore, instead of raising everyone's expectations and then not being able to deliver services until months later, we decided to wait until we were closed to connecting our first customer.
